

WEEK ST MARY BONAVENTURES W.I.

What a way to spend a beautiful evening! Luckily, several of our members had booked to go on a visit to Trigon Farm which is located near Holsworthy not knowing that we would be so lucky with the weather. After a very successful talk earlier this year by the owner, Al, we had responded to his invitation to visit the farm and check it out for ourselves.

Al and his family moved to their farm in 2020. It was important to them to start from scratch and design a new farm using permaculture principles, nodig and regenerative agricultural practices. They are passionate about growing chemical free food and use the no-dig method to grow vegetables and flowers, where they do not disturb the soil but let the micro-organisms, fungi and worms do their work. In turn the whole soil structure improves over time and the aim is to create a stable, bio-diverse system.

Apart from showing us the vegetable and flower beds, we were also shown the hundreds of various trees that had been planted. These included different types of willow being grown for wind breaks, structures and for weaving material. They have had to use poly-tunnels because of the uncertain weather and these help to ensure that the farm is virtually self-sufficient in vegetables and fruit including winter time, obviously with the help of food either being frozen or preserved. What was reassuring was that he was happy to show us where he had been made to move his plants because they were "in the wrong place" or even grow something else because the conditions were unfavourable. Trial and error obviously works for everyone!

During his talk we had been told about the chickens they have on the farm which help with caterpillars and we met these along with the ducks which help devour the slugs. He has now added goats (which were very friendly and love willow bark) and will be including pigs very soon. Our tour of the garden ended with a choice of ordinary or delicious homemade mint tea and biscuits. The fact that all this is on our doorstep has encouraged us to make plans for a further visit to sample the food there later in the summer.

The farm offers various courses and workshops such as Natural skincare. They also offer sustainable flowers for any occasion e.g.weddings as well as guided farm tours and Pizza evenings Apart from this, depending on the season, the farm also sells skincare salves, vegetable boxes, PYO flowers, posies, bouquets and wreaths. Week St Mary Church Renovations

Week St Mary Church is embarking upon a series of projects to repair and improve the building to keep it fit for the many uses for which the community needs it.

The North Door was recently removed for (grant aided) repairs and will be back soon to be fitted with draught proofing and left in a condition which will enable us to open it and use it as an emergency exit - something which has not been possible within living memory. (Photo attached)

We have been very fortunate to have received an anonymous gift sufficient to pay for the installation of glass doors on the outer opening of the main porch entrance. This will also improve the draught proofing of that entrance to retain heat inside in the winter and make the porch a comfortable and attractive place to sit throughout the year.

And finally, we are about to embark upon a major restoration of the church tower which will provide a new roof, repairs to the internal floors, including that under the bell frame, new bird guards to the sound louvres and extensive repointing. We are hoping to pay for this (at a cost of somewhere over £120,000) with grants but will of course be fund raising locally as well. The last time any major capital works were done on our church was 1879 when a nearly derelict building was extensively renovated. We are hoping that our generation will leave the legacy of an ancient, historic building in good order and fit for modern use for the next 150 years - this will also include future projects such as a new roof which is the next challenge! 

COFFEE & WALNUT CAKE

Ingredients

250g Butter: 225g / 8oz caster sugar: 4 large eggs: 225g / 8oz self raising flour: ½ level teaspoon baking powder: 1 tbsp instant coffee, dissolved in 1 tablespoon of boiling water: 50g / 1¾oz walnuts, finely chopped.

For the filling and topping

125g / 4 ½oz butter, softened: 225g / 8oz icing sugar, sifted: 1 tablespoon instant coffee, dissolved in 1 tablespoon of boiling water 8 walnut halves to decorate

Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4. Lightly butter two deep loose-bottomed 20cm/8in round tins and line the bases with baking paper.

- 1. Put the butter, sugar, eggs, flour, baking powder and coffee in a large mixing bowl and beat together (using an electric hand whisk if you have one) until well combined and smooth. Fold in the walnuts.
- 2. Divide the mixture evenly between the tins. Level the surface using a spatula or the back of a spoon.
- 3. Bake for 25-28 minutes, or until an inserted skewer comes out clean. Leave the cakes to cool in the tins for 5 minutes, then run a small palette knife or rounded butter knife around the edge of the tins and carefully turn the cakes out onto a wire rack. Peel off the paper and leave to cool completely.
- 4. For the filling and topping, beat the butter and gradually add the icing sugar. Add the coffee and beat until smooth.

5. Choose the cake with the best top, then put the other cake upside-down onto a serving plate and spread with half the coffee icing. Sandwich together with the other half. Ice the top of the cake and decorate with the walnut pieces to serve.

POTATO, CHEESE AND ONION PIE using Shortcrust Pastry – Any Recipe

CHEESE & THYME BISCUITS

160g plain flour: 100g cold butter: 1 egg

100g finely grated cheddar;

½ tsp dried thyme

Method

- 1. Heat oven to 180c/160c fan/gas 4. Put the flour in a bowl and rub in the butter until it resembles breadcrumbs. Stir in the cheese and thyme, then add the beaten egg a little at a time and mix using a fork. When the mix starts to clump together, use fingers to knead to a smooth dough.
- 2. Roll into a sausage shape approx 20cm long them cut into 1cm slices. Place on one or two baking trays. Flatten slightly with a fork then bake for approx. 15 mins. or until firm. Cool slightly before placing on a wire tray to cool completely. Will keep for up to 1 week in an airtight container. These are better prepared the day before.

4 ROCK CAKES

Ingredients

225g/8oz self-raising flour 75g/2½oz caster sugar 1 tsp baking powder 125g/4½oz butter, cut into cubes 150g/5½oz dried fruit (raisins, sultanas or currants)

1 egg 1 tbsp milk

•

Method Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4

Mix the flour, sugar and baking powder in a bowl and rub in the cubed butter until the mixture looks like breadcrumbs, then mix in the dried fruit.

In a clean bowl, beat the egg and milk together

Add the egg mixture to the dry ingredients and stir with a spoon until the mixture just comes together as a thick, lumpy dough. Add a teaspoon more milk if you need it to make the mixture stick together.

Place spoonfuls of the mixture onto the prepared baking tray. Leave space between them as they will flatten and spread out to double their size during baking. Bake for 15–20 minutes, until golden-brown. Allow to cool for a couple of minutes, then turn them out onto a wire rack to cool.



We would also like to extend particular appreciation to our post office trained volunteers. Their commitment and training provide an essential service to the village, allowing us to offer more than just shopping—a true lifeline for many.

Together, your efforts have made the shop more than a place to just buy milk and bread. It's a place of connection and community spirit.

WEEK ST MARY COMMUNITY SHOP

Annual Accounts for the year ending 28th February 2025

Stephen Smith presented the financial report.

A draft Profit & Loss Account and Balance Sheet for 2025 were circulated to shareholders with the notice of the meeting.

The full accounts have subsequently been examined and signed by Haines & Co who have again acted as independent reviewer this year. Full copies of the signed accounts are available at this meeting for members to look at or on request afterwards.

The accounts show a loss of £2,212. This is mainly due to the impact of depreciation of assets acquired in 2021/22 which were fully funded by Covid-

related grants which under accounting rules had to be fully recognised as income in 2020/21. It is more meaningful to focus on the position without this historical hangover which is that we sustained a loss of £516.

Sales of £194,661, footfall of 566 per week and the gross margin of 18.4% were all close to the previous year.

- Expenses of £42,455 were £1,064 (3%) up on the previous year despite cost saving initiatives implemented by the Management Committee. The main driver of the increase was staff costs following an uplift in the National Living Wage.
- Donations of £1,000 from WSM Parish Council and £150 from Meet & Eat mitigated the reported loss.
- On the Balance Sheet, stocks rose slightly to £17,332 whilst cash balances remain healthy.

The result for 2024/25 continues the trend evident post Covid of sales flatlining whilst costs continue to rise for reasons beyond our control. During that 4 year period, sales have been around £195,000 each year despite inflation whilst costs have risen by 8%.

Faced with a similar outlook for 2025/26 the Management Committee decided to mothball one of the freezers in April to save over £1,000 of electricity costs whilst only slightly narrowing the product range. This will largely offset this year's salary increase.

Further ahead there is a need to re-structure the operation which Linda will talk more about.

WEEK ST MARY COMMUNITY SHOP

Report of the Management Committee for AGM and Parish Council

As Stephen says now is the time to look to the future of our community shop. Unless we make some changes, we could end up incurring unsustainable losses if sales remain static and costs continue rising.

This report together with Stephen's and my earlier Chair's remarks will be put in the August Village Magazine and Facebook for all to read. We have the opportunity to extend our lease earlier than May 2027 when it is due for renewal. We currently have a 6 months breakpoint in our lease

should we need it.

Jackie is due to retire in February 2026. We as a Management Committee will be advertising for a new manager in mid November with a start date of 7th February so that will give a 2-week crossover between managers.

We aim to have applications in by 2nd week of December with interviews in early January. We would prefer to have someone who has experience but training could be given if needed.

Based on the current level of demand/footfall we have no choice but to restructure staffing hours to re-set the cost base. We are looking at ways of dropping down to 27 paid hours per week in March 2026 from the current 33 and opening shorter hours if volunteer support is insufficient.

We have repeatedly asked for more volunteers but hardly ever get any interest, this has been highlighted recently when Jackie was on holiday at the same time as some regular "volunteers" and we had to take the decision to close the shop on both Tuesday afternoons which as a committee we apologise for but was unavoidable.

A few hours by anyone new would help lighten the load of the few who do many hours behind the counter or man the Post Office.

We strive to keep the Community Shop an available and integral part of the village but without some more help this will become increasingly difficult.

To take things forward we have therefore taken the decision to hold an open meeting to discuss what the parishioners want from their Community Shop or do they even want it at all. A sobering thought: in the first year of operation (2017/18) shop footfall was 861 per week – it is now 566.

WSM Shop & Post Office – "AN UNCERTAIN FUTURE" meeting will be held in the Parish Hall on the 25th September This will be an Open Meeting for the Parish.

Playground

Cllr Slade said a playing field working group was held. Repair needs to be done to the fence between the two fields. The hand sanitiser has been filled. The tennis court needs strimming and the new play equipment needs oiling. The tennis net post has been bent. Cllr Slade and Cllr Johns, along with help from a resident, raised the tennis net up, which is ok for the time being. The pen has been purchased for the board. There is a bin near the skate ramp that can be placed at the bottom (Paddy Fay said this would be ok). Cllr Shipton said she had completed the inspection. There were some pot holes on the tennis court. Cllr Gubbin said there were a couple of screws on the skate ramp that needed attention. Cllr Couch said the skate ramp sides has created a ladder effect – this will be looked at for maintenance.

Highways, Footpaths & Greens

Cllr Slade said someone hit something in the road by the pub car park. Greenamoor Cross has been reported for strimming. Cllr Couch said there is road subsidence at Week Green Close. These have been reported and marked by Highways for attention. Cllrs Couch and Fay have looked at the roads, which are in a pretty good state. Trees overhanging on Parsonage Green have been reported.

Ashbury Grove

After being offered the parcel of land with some funds towards its upkeep, Cllr Slade suggested appointing a solicitor. It was proposed to get three quotes and go with the cheapest.

Football club lease

Paddy Fay asked if the council would agree to a 25-year lease due to the cost of the lease. He also asked if the football club could repay their half over three years. It was proposed to accept these changes and instruct the solicitor.

Play park slide steps

Cllr Slade said it is possible to add new steps, but could cost in the region of £3,000. Cllr Shipton said she received a few suggestions from TK Play, such as parallel to give more footage; to connect a mini tower to existing equipment or change the steps which would cost around £1,200 to £1,300 to do. Cllr Couch said there was no benefit of moving the steps, but the council could possibly look at a separate smaller slide for toddlers. He said there was nothing for the young, two-to-three-year age range. He suggested the playing field group come up with some options. Cllr Slade will contact TK Play to ask for some recommendations for that age range.

Playing field gate key

Cllr Slade said she met the ambulance staff there recently when they used the field. They said Week St Mary's facilities were one of the best sites. There was talk of having a key at the parish hall, but she was told they would not have time. They said the main problem was with people parking in front of the gates and going off. They only need one side of the gate to be open. Cllr Fay said there was concern recently of there only being two key holders (if they were not at home or not available). Cllr Richardson said there has not been an access issue. The council decided to take no further action.

Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI)

Cllr Couch explained that he does a lot of EDI at work. He proposed that the council adopts a brief EDI statement. He also urged councillors to make a commitment to go online to read some information about EDI. Some areas would include a statement on the minutes, that if anyone has any accessible needs, to contact the parish clerk so we can help; also, when talking about the play park. He proposed that the council look online to gather some EDI awareness and he would draft an EDI statement and send to the clerk.

Parish council Facebook page

Cllr Couch set up a parish council Facebook page, and went live with some local road issues. He said it went live on June 20 and as of today there were 3,230 views. It was suggested by Cllr Gubbin that all councillors have access, with no personal opinions. Cllr Fay said it's a good way to let people know what the parish council does. It was proposed that the clerk will send round a draft social media policy and this will be placed on the next agenda. This will include admin roles and content.

Tech drop-in

Cllr Fay said she would like to use the village hall. Notice would be given to people in the magazine to let them know when the clinics are being held. This will be further discussed in August.

Playing field booking guide and form

This will be deferred to the August meeting.

Fundraising

Cllr Couch said NALC hold a course called beyond the precept, looking at alternative income sources (£35 plus VAT). Cllr Slade said she would be willing to attend.

Neighbourhood Watch

Cllr Couch said he has become a co-ordinator. He said the parish council may want to have an input into this. He has a meeting planned with PC Nina. He felt to have a parish council rep would be good PR. This will become a portfolio report on each agenda – police/Neighbourhood Watch.

Citizens Advice letter

The correspondence was noted but the parish council does not have funds at present.

Bin

This is on hold while the spare bin is utilised.

Cornwall Council Street Trading Policy consultation No comment from the parish council.

Village equipment

This will be deferred until August.

20mph roll out meeting

Cllr Fay gave a report of the meeting she attended and some notes were provided by Cornwall Council. Councillors were happy with proposals. It was also proposed that Cllrs Fay and Richardson be the council's representatives for the scheme.

Documentation uplift

Cllr Couch said he does a lot of policy writing at work. He said there were lots of policies missing – no risk assessment or terms of reference for the roles and responsibilities. Cllr Couch would liaise with the clerk and Cllr Slade to look at policies to bring back to a monthly meeting.



Fire brigades attend 3 lithium-ion battery fires daily in 2024

Fires caused by lithium-ion batteries, found in e-bikes and e-scooters, double in two years, with UK fire brigades addressing at least three lithium-ion battery fires every day in 2024.

Reports related to lithium-ion battery fires surged by 93% between 2022 and 2024 according to UK fire services and 11 people died and hundreds more injured cause by them.

Lithium-ion batteries can be found in most rechargeable devices, and improper storage and battery overcharging are the most common cause of fire breakout.

Lithium-ion battery fires are different to other fires. Due to a chemical reaction, they burn extremely hot and fast. They spread rapidly and can be difficult to put out, even reignite hours or even days later. These fires release dangerous gases, including carbon monoxide and hydrogen fluoride, making them a hazard to anyone in the vicinity.

Lithium-ion battery fires can produce their own oxygen during thermal runaway, smothering the fire isn't likely to put it out. Even water might not be effective enough to stop it from spreading.

Be aware of fire exits when you store e-bikes and e-scooters indoors. Many families with electronic bikes and scooters will store them inside, along hallways or in garages, which can be very dangerous. If one of these combusts, it could block emergency exits or ignite other flammable materials around it.

Wherever you choose to store these items, be aware of the risks and make sure your whole family know the best ways to exit the home in the event of an emergency.

Improper storage and disposal of electronics are a common cause of fires. Electronics that use lithium-ion batteries should always be stored in a cool, dry place, away from direct sunlight and flammable materials.

Do not leave laptops or phones to charge for long periods and look out for warning signs of a failing battery, which includes, bulging swelling, and being hot to the touch.

Do not throw devices with lithium-ion batteries in the rubbish or recycling bins. If crushed or damaged, these batteries can ignite and cause dangerous fires.

Dispose batteries and rechargeable electronics at household waste recycling centres.


